General Information

Description

This course will cover the materials and techniques used to paint with dyes on cotton and silk fabrics, and the use of cold-water fiber reactive dyes to alter the color of natural fibers. Safety practices will be an integral part of the course, including the proper mixing and storage of dye pigments, use of personal protective equipment, and regular cleaning and maintenance of a costume craft area.

Expectations and Goals

By the end of this course students will be able to understand and put into practice:

- Preparing dyes to paint designs directly onto cotton and silk
- Safely mixing and storing dye stuffs
- Proper use of personal protection equipment
- Applying color theory to the mixing of dyes to alter the color of fabric
- Creating and replicating dye recipes at different volumes
- Maintaining an organized and clean costume craft area

Due to the nature of this course, it is necessary for all students enrolled to complete the majority of the projects as assigned in the Craft Room. Some projects will require students to sign up for work sessions in order to ensure safe access to the equipment and supplies. Students can expect to spend approximately 2-3 hours per week outside of the scheduled class time on homework projects.

The Craft Room, like the Costume Shop, is not reserved solely for class purposes. As such, the space must be maintained on a daily basis. Special attention must be paid when production and class work overlaps in order to allow for each to progress as necessary.

The Costume Shop and its related areas, including the Craft Room, are open Monday through Friday from 9am to 5pm. During THE 4950 Production Workshop, access to the costume shop may be limited, but is always negotiable. Production Workshop meets Monday through Thursday during periods 6 &7, 12:50pm to 2:45pm. If you would like to work on homework during this time, please check in with the instructor of record or graduate teaching assistant leading Production Workshop that day. There may be spaces in other costume areas available even if the Costume Shop is at capacity.

Additional homework hours are available Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays from 5pm to 8pm. A graduate teaching assistant will be present in the building to monitor the production shops during these times.
