DESCRIPTION

Use dynamic drawing techniques and approaches to explore contemporary art and connections across disciplines.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Students will explore a variety of drawing practices including observational still life studies, figure drawing, interior and exterior perspective studies, and drawing from memory and the imagination. Students participating in this class will be able to:

- make informed choices in drawing tools and materials
- accurately represent perceptions in 2D format
- make informed choices in representation to promote the communication of content
- apply knowledge of historic and contemporary sources in the development of content
- use drawing and design skills to visually communicate abstract concepts/ideas
- apply a visual vocabulary of marks to achieve expressive outcomes
- articulate the uses of representation and translation through historic and contemporary precedents during critiques
- describe one's own philosophy of drawing
- critique works based on technical, aesthetic, and philosophical considerations
- be conversant in the embeddedness of drawing in all art practices

SKILL SETS

- Develop a full range of drawing skills and vocabulary of mark-making
- Accurate perceptual drawing
- Develop a thematic body of drawings
- Knowledge and application of 2D design principles
- Knowledge of drawing tools and materials

- Develop critical vocabulary and research skills
- Develop understanding of the relationship between the history of art and contemporary art practices

MAJOR TOPICS

- Elements of Drawing: line, shape, value, volume, space, texture, composition
- Principles of Art: balance, proportion, rhythm, emphasis, unity
- Drawing Practices: contemporary, historical
- Philosophies of Drawing
- Drawing Media: traditional, contemporary technologies
- Critical Conversations about Drawing

EVALUATION

Work completed in Non-Majors Drawing will be graded on specific criteria defined by individual project goals. However, all projects will be graded on the student's success in the following areas: concept development, design decisions, craftsmanship, risk-taking, experimentation, ambition, and meeting deadlines.

The course grade for each student will be evaluated on the basis of:

- The completion and success of all exercises, sketchbook activities, and drawing projects
- Class attendance
- Active participation in all assigned activities, discussions, and critiques
- Research the conceptual tools you employ to inform your practice
- Technical competence, craft, and inventive use of materials
- Presentation work should be presented in a finished and professional manner
- Effort, hard work, and a display of diligent, consistent effort toward excellence

80% Projects and Assignments

- 65% In-class sketchbook activities, exercises, and drawing projects
 - Classes will include prompted sketchbook activities that students will engage in for the first 25-30 minutes of class. The rest of class will consist of drawing exercises and/or more work on developed drawings projects that may occur over several class periods.
- 15% Final Portfolio Consists of your 8 best drawings from the semester
 - High quality (no smaller than 1920 x 1920 pixels), well cropped, and well labeled photographs of 8 chosen drawings are expected to be submitted on Canvas in addition to submission of actual drawings. More details TBA.

20% Participation

Participation includes arriving at the studio on time, ready to work, with materials, studio clean up, following health and safety guidelines, and active participation in class discussions and critiques. Participation grades will be determined and submitted on canvas at midterm and then once more at the end of the semester.

Specific criteria for grading includes: adherence to the assignment parameters, research/studio practice, concept development, formal resolution, and craft/presentation. Late projects will not be accepted.

Project grades in this course are considered in the following way:

- A 4.0 Exceptional work, all criteria of assignment have been surpassed in a distinguished manner and solutions to problems presented exhibit a depth of understanding. In addition, student is engaged in exceptional studio practice, which includes active research, looking up artists recommended, asking relevant questions about other artists' works or ideas, and being thoroughly engaged in the course content.
- A- 3.67 Well-presented, superior work: all criteria of assignment were surpassed in a distinguished manner (including exceptional studio practice highlighted above). Minimal improvements could be made to the project overall.
- B+ 3.33 Very good work: all criteria of assignment were surpassed, minor changes could be considered and executed to bring piece together and studio practice was exceptional.
- B 3.0 Very good work: above average solutions and clear potential. Most criteria of assignment were surpassed with some improvements to be made. Execution was well done. Studio practice during the project was commendable.
- B- 2.67 Good work: most criteria of assignment were met. Work showed promise with a few significant improvements to be made. Studio practice was adequate.
- C+ 2.33 Slightly above average: work, most of the criteria of the assignment were met. The work is not yet a unified whole or cohesive statement, yet effort was made. Studio practice was adequate, but could be more reflective and thoughtful.
- C 2.0 Average work: the assignment directions were followed and the requirements were met in a relatively routine way. Slippage in levels of craft, originality and presentation-studio practice was adequate, but could be more reflective and thoughtful.
- C- 2.67 Slightly below average work: the assignment directions were followed and the requirements were minimally met, but there is much room for developing concepts further. The level of craft and breadth and depth of idea development needs to be improved. There is some evidence of studio practice, but the quality and quantity is lacking.
- D+ 1.33 Below average work: an attempt to solve the problem was made, but there is much room for improving skills and developing your concepts further. The criteria of the assignment are barely met. Basic craftsmanship skills have been neglected and there is a lack of breadth and depth of idea development. There is minimal evidence of studio practice, but the quality and quantity is lacking.
- D 1.0 Inadequate, below average work: the requirements of the assignment are not addressed. The execution of the work is careless and represents an incomplete effort. Work is substandard. There is little or no evidence of studio practice.

- D- 0.67 Unacceptable work and effort: the requirements of the assignment are not addressed. The execution of the work is careless and represents an incomplete effort. Work is substandard. There is little or no evidence of studio practice.
- E 0 Unacceptable work and effort: the work submitted is inadequate; the requirements of the problem are not addressed. The piece represents careless and/ or incomplete effort. No evidence of studio practice. Work is substandard. Or, assignment was not submitted.

Students must earn a grade higher than C- to earn credit toward their major.

ATTENDANCE

The majority of coursework will take place in the studio during class time, so your attendance and active participation is required. Students are expected to attend all classes. You are required to work/participate the duration of the scheduled class period. Full participation includes showing completed work during all scheduled critiques as well as active participation through shared ideas and commentary about your work and the work of your peers. Unexcused absences will be cause for a lowered grade. Your fourth absence will result in ONE full letter grade drop. Absences will be counted from the first class meeting onward.

Students should check with the instructor or another student outside of class time when they miss a class (prior to missing the class if possible), as in-class exercises, activities, and drawing projects are spontaneously assigned. TARDINESS

Arrival to class after the start of class will be noted and three such incidences will count as one absence. Leaving early from class will also be considered as tardiness and will be counted as such. Students are responsible for satisfying all academic objectives as defined by the instructor. Students who do not attend at least one of the first two class meetings of a course or laboratory in which they are registered, and who have not contacted the department to indicate their intent, may be dropped from the course. The university recognizes the right of the individual professor to

make attendance mandatory. After due warning, professors may prohibit further attendance and subsequently assign a failing grade for excessive absences.

LATE WORK

All drawings, sketchbook activities, exercises, and projects must be completed on time for full credit. Due dates will be announced in class and posted on canvas. It is the student's responsibility to turn in all work on time. Late work is not accepted (unless with prior approval from instructor due to an excused absence). If the timeline states that a project is due at the beginning of class, turning it in at the end or after class is considered late. You must have work finished before the start of class on scheduled critique days or your work will not be critiqued.

CLASS PREPAREDNESS

For this class, you will use your own paper and drawing materials, which you will purchase during the first week of the semester (see Materials List). Included in the Materials List is a storage bin to keep your art materials in. Bring your bin to class everyday; most (if not all) your materials should fit in there or you can switch them out depending on the project. The most important materials to bring to class everyday include:

- Your art bin with graphite pencils, vine charcoal, compressed charcoal, erasers, sharpener, tortillon, tape, and bull clips (at the minimum)
- Sketchbook
- 18 x 24" Newsprint Pad
- 18 x 24" Strathmore Drawing Pad
- Portfolio to store and transport drawings

LOCKERS AND STORAGE

Lockers are available to students for storage. Lockers are located on the second floor of FAD. Each student must share a locker with two students. Locks are not supplied. The School of Art + Art History is not responsible for items in lockers. Please watch for posted signs on lockers regarding their use. You are responsible for keeping the locker form attached AT ALL TIMES to your lockers. Lockers must be cleaned out at the end of each semester. When storing materials, you must write your name on everything with a black marker, the course you are in, the semester, and the instructor's name.

SHARED STUDIO

Read and respect studio use guidelines posted in classrooms. Regardless of the condition you find the studio in, we request that you leave it clean for the next person. This is a shared workspace, and we all need to be diligent together to keep it an immaculate and productive environment.

GENERAL SAFETY AND CLEANLINESS

- There is a first aid kit in each room for your use.
- Do not eat in any areas where art supplies are being used.
- Label your materials and artwork clearly with your name.

- Wear clothes you can afford to get charcoal/ink on or wear a smock.
- Be spatially aware; charcoal on your hands will transfer to anything you touch.
- Keep all shared equipment clear and clean. Wipe them down after use if necessary.
- Do not pour solvents down sinks.
- Fixative must be sprayed in the FAC 2nd Floor spray booth, NO exceptions.
- You will be given the combination to the studio, it is for YOUR use only.
- The studio is available for your use outside of class time. Always check the schedule posted on the door outside to ensure you are not disrupting a class.

CLEAN UP PROTOCOL

Each student is responsible for assisting in studio clean-up. Your instructor may assign you a duty at the end of each class. The classroom should be organized at the end of each class 10 minutes prior to the beginning of the next class with the help of all students enrolled in the course.

- Place all work-in-progress on the designated storage shelves at the end of each class. Take all finished work home.
- Return easels, drawing horses, drawing boards, and stools to their designated location at the end of class. Clean/wipe down if necessary.
- Check the floor for charcoal, ink, graphite, eraser shavings, etc. and sweep if necessary.
- Take all your art materials with you to and from class. The instructor and the School of Art and Art History are not responsible for materials and projects left in studios. Each student is responsible for ensuring that their projects and materials are safely stored and removed from the studio.

HAZARDOUS WASTE SATELLITE ACCUMULATION

Bins and storage containers utilized in this area should NEVER be moved or used for any other purpose. When in doubt about the safety or disposal of your art materials, please speak with faculty. A Handbook of Hazardous Wastes Disposal, Health and Safety is posted in the studio for consultation as well.

ELECTRONIC DEVICES/DEMEANOR POLICY
