#### **DESCRIPTION & OBJECTIVES**

This 3-credit course explores the aesthetic, technical, and conceptual practices of image making with digital media within the context of contemporary art. Students will examine how to perceive, iterate, communicate, and create compelling digital images with an emphasis on the exploratory, experimental, and conceptual.

Course topics are addressed through lectures, demos, exercises, projects, readings, and student presentations. Students are evaluated based on contributions to class discussion, process work, presentations, critiques, and aesthetic, technical, and conceptual development in their digital image making art practices. Software explored includes Adobe Photoshop, Illustrator, and XD.

Through in-class and formal assignments and projects students will:

- Explore digital imaging concepts of composition, aesthetics, and conceptual ideation
- Digital image capture, creation, and edit fundamentals
- Create work utilizing software basics of Photoshop, Illustrator, and XD
- Research methods to inform visual art-making process and practice
- Document work development and process iterations electronically
- Develop visual literacy and critical thinking skills through participating in critiques
- · Learn about contemporary artists who work with conceptual ideas as part of their practice

# **TEXTBOOKS AND MATERIALS**

All required texts will be available on Canvas. Additional resources will be listed on individual project sheets to check out from the library if desired. Students are required to register with LinkedIn Learning and have access to reliable internet, computer, and the Adobe Creative Cloud. Note: The Adobe Creative applications require up-to-date computer hardware and software. #### **COURSE STRUCTURE**

This course consists of lectures, demos, in-class exercises, readings/research, written responses, projects, and critiques. Students should expect to work a minimum of 5 hours weekly beyond class time. Weekly content is laid out in the Assignments section of Canvas with the weekly expectations. Activities and projects to turn in are also located in the Assignments section of Canvas. Responses to readings and lectures are in the Discussions section. Projects will be available in the Assignments section and will focus on learning specific techniques and software while developing your nuanced conceptual ideas and imaging strategies.

#### METHOD OF INSTRUCTION

This course will consist of class instruction and feature days for projects and homework where students are able to work on projects; a tentative schedule to specify which days are scheduled to be studio workdays. On studio workdays, students are required to upload assignments and process work and/or multiple progress images and documentation to Canvas that are due by the end of the class period and which count for completed assignment work and attendance documentation.

#### **Projects**

- 1. Tropisms Composite imaging, Adobe Photoshop
- 2. Sensation vs Monument Adobe Photoshop and Illustrator
- 3. Unconscious vs Human and Machines Adobe XD and Web

#### Critique

A core objective of this course is practicing the art of critique; at the end of each project there will be a formal critique. You are required to submit your project and artist statement on Canvas by 2:00 pm the day of critique. Critiques will provide an opportunity to use imaging vocabulary, recognize opportunities for improvement, and develop effective imaging strategies. You will learn how to offer articulate explanations for your choices. Equally important is your ability to give constructive responses for your peers' work. It is a requirement of this course that you participate fully in these group conversations. Because of the collective aspect of the critique, it is mandatory that you are present. A portion of your grade will come from your contributions in critique. Everyone is expected to talk and participate during critique.

All projects will be graded via assignments on Canvas and will be available to see in Canvas as well as the due date. Late assignments are **not** generally accepted unless there is there is valid documented medical excuse. Projects will **not** be accepted after the due date without prior permission. Participation includes contributing to small-group and whole-class critiques and attentiveness and respect towards all fellow classmates as well as attendance.
