COURSE OBJECTIVES

Performance and critical thinking of the 21st century musical theatre canon examining styles, repertoire and techniques. Vocal styles, choreography and audition repertoire will also be examined.

- A. To establish a common vocabulary and analysis that serves as a foundation for exploration and critical thinking of the 21st Century Musical Theatre Canon.
- B. To increase skills and develop a methodology of the construct of the script and score in a musical.
- C. To develop in the student an understanding of discipline through the art and to refine skills necessary to keep up with professional demands.
- D. To develop in the student a collaborative nature by utilizing exercises with their fellow actor while understanding the physical and emotional demands necessary in Musical Theatre performance.

COURSE CONTENT

- A. Warm-up ritual.
- B. Scene study, performance and audition techniques.
- C. Exploring 21st century styles of choreography and application through collaboration.
- D. The developmental process of creating a character and musical scene study analysis.
- E. Deconstructing script and score analysis as a foundation to study the musical formula inherent in a particular musical and discussing diversity, identity and inclusion as it pertains to particular shows of study in the 21st century.

ATTENDANCE POLICY FOR PERFORMANCE CLASSES THAT MEET 2 TIMES A WEEK.

Barring the above circumstances, students are expected to be in attendance (either remotely or in-person, as assigned) daily and to be on time. The first “unexcused” absence will result in a half letter grade (5%) from the final grade. All additional “unexcused” absences will result in a penalty of a full letter grade (10%) from the final grade. To be considered “excused” an absence must be accompanied by appropriate official documentation. Religious observances do not require documentation. Three tardies are counted as one absence.

Any absence from class for the following reasons must be supported by official acceptable documentation to avoid a grade penalty:

- Illness—doctor's note must be on official letterhead with address and phone number, noting the date and time of visit and diagnosis verifying that an absence from class is warranted, doctor name and signature.
- Military obligation
- Court-imposed legal obligations (e.g., jury duty or subpoena)
