COURSE DESCRIPTION

This inter-disciplinary studio course exploring narrative and storytelling as inspiration and material for artmaking. Students will examine how to perceive and communicate stories, making works rooted in narrative with an emphasis on experimentation. Hands-on demonstrations in alternate paper and photo processes will inspire your artmaking techniques and expand your toolbox.

PARTICIPATION

The class dynamic depends on your energy, initiative, attitude, productivity, and willingness to get involved in group discussion. Attending an in-person studio class is your opportunity to experiment, develop your art practice, and exchange ideas with the instructors, guest artists, and classmates. Take advantage of this time away from home. Ask questions and contribute answers. Offer constructive feedback during discussions and critique. Reflect on the comments you receive to gauge the effectiveness of your work. Examine the way your ideas change, evolve, and influence formal and conceptual choices in your work. Your development as an artist and educator hinges on your ability to make effective choices and express ideas clearly.

EVALUATION AND GRADING CRITERIA

Breakdown of grades:

Pre-studio assignments: read/watch, reflections, + art experiments = 30%

In-studio assignments: art experiments = 20%

Participation / effort + daily news + sketchbook = 30%

Final presentation = 20%

Work will be graded on its success in the following areas: risk-taking / experimentation, craft, ambition, and concept development.

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ART MATERIALS TO BRING*

- Sketchbook, no smaller than 5x7 (same one you have been using to complete the pre-studio assignments)
- Three to five photos that you love, printed out 4x6 or 5x7 on matte paper (if not possible, glossy paper is also fine). These prints can be from cell phone or digital images or from old analog photos that you photograph with your cell phone and have reproduced. The images can be artistic, abstract, altered / filtered, documentation, images of your pets or someone that you love any images that you'd like to make into an artwork. You can have them printed very cheaply at Walgreens or CVS or the like (plan to spend no more than \$3 each). DO NOT bring precious irreplaceable original analog photos.
- Selection of items for collaging such as magazines, colored papers, postcards, other photos you have printed, etc. Nothing too precious that you would mind cutting up (Note that we will also have a selection of printed materials on site, so if arriving by plane, don't feel obligated to bring too much)
- Elmer's glue or other glue stick for collaging
- X-acto knife with extra blades
- Scissors (for those arriving by plane, these can be acquired in Gainesville)
- Ruler
- Kitchen/dishwashing gloves
- A selection of mark making materials you enjoy such as pencils, markers, watercolors, acrylic paints, etc. (no solvents or oil-based materials)
- Smartphone or digital camera for photography
- Ear buds / headphones for your smartphone so you can listen to music (if desired)
- Self-healing cutting mat (not required)
- Laptop (not required)
- Polaroid camera and film (not required)

*Note: A Publix grocery store and CVS store are within walking distance of our classroom (approx. 5 to 20-minutes). Generic school supplies from watercolors and tape to rubber cement and glue sticks are available for purchase.

GRADING SCALE

A = 4.0

Exceptional work; all criteria of assignment have been surpassed in a distinguished manner and solutions to problems presented exhibit a depth of understanding. In addition, student is engaged in exceptional studio practice, which includes active research, looking up artists recommended, asking relevant questions about other artists' works or ideas, and being thoroughly engaged in course content.

A = 3.67

Well-presented, superior work: all criteria of assignment were surpassed in a distinguished manner (including exceptional studio practice highlighted above). Minimal improvements could be made to the project overall.

B+ = 3.33

Very good work: all criteria of assignment were surpassed, minor changes could be considered and executed to bring piece together. Studio practice was exceptional.

B = 3.0

Very good work: above average solutions and clear potential. Most criteria of assignment were surpassed with some improvements to be made. Execution was well done. Studio practice during the project was commendable.

B - = 2.67

Good work: most criteria of assignment were met. Work showed promise with a few significant improvements to be made. Studio practice was adequate.

C + = 2.33

Slightly above average work: most of the criteria of the assignment were met. The work is not yet a unified whole or cohesive statement, yet effort was made. Studio practice was adequate, but could be more reflective and thoughtful.

C = 2.0

Average work: the assignment directions were followed and the requirements were met in a relatively routine way. Slippage in levels of craft, originality and presentation. Studio practice was adequate, but could be more reflective and thoughtful.

C = 2.67

Slightly below average work: the assignment directions were followed and the requirements were minimally met, but there is much room for developing assignment's concepts further. The level of craft and breadth and depth of idea development needs improvement. There is some evidence of studio practice, but the quality and quantity is lacking.

D+ = 1.33

Below average work: an attempt to solve the problem was made, but there is much room for improving skills and developing concepts further. The criteria of the assignment are barely met. Basic craftsmanship skills have been neglected and there is a lack of breadth and depth of idea development. There is minimal evidence of studio practice, but the quality and quantity are lacking.

D = 1.0

Inadequate, below average work: the requirements of the assignment are not addressed. The execution of the work is careless and represents an incomplete effort. Work is substandard. There is little or no evidence of studio practice.

D - = .67

Unacceptable work and effort: the requirements of the assignment are not addressed. The execution of the work is careless and represents an incomplete effort. Work is substandard. There is little or no evidence of studio practice.

E = 0

Unacceptable work and effort: the work submitted is inadequate; the requirements of the problem are not addressed. The piece represents careless and/ or incomplete effort. No evidence of studio practice. Work is substandard. Or, assignment was not submitted.

*Please note that a C- or below is not an acceptable grade for any course in which a 2.0 GPA (or C) is required, i.e., any course in the major.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

Due to the accelerated nature of this studio course, attendance is crucial. Students are expected to arrive to class on time and be prepared to participate in all activities.

Your participation grade will drop a full letter after two unexcused absences. Following that, each unexcused absence will drop your participation grade by another letter. To pass the class, students must be present and participate in the final presentations and clean-up on Sat July 27.
