ARH4931 Art History Seminar: Role of the Artist

Course Description

This seminar concentrates on the biographical approach, one of the most fundamental methods of art history. We will study how the paradigm of the artist as an individual creative actor developed by way of the European authors Giorgio Vasari and Francisco Pacheco. Then we will question how their approach has been (and can be) applied to the arts and artists of colonial Latin America, ca. 1520–1820. In the course of the semester we will read Professor Stanfield-Mazzi's book co-edited with Margarita Vargas-Betancourt, *Collective Creativity and Artistic Agency in Colonial Latin America*, to see the many ways the biographical approach can be revisited and critiqued. While the focus will be on Latin America, students may choose to research artists or art worlds in other places from the fifteenth to the nineteenth centuries.

Expected Learning Outcomes


This class serves undergraduate art history majors as a capstone course drawing on their previous art history training and culminating in a substantial research paper. Students should:

- perfect their abilities to read, write about, and discuss scholarly texts.
- practice posing discussion questions and leading class discussion.
- refine their scholarly research and writing skills.
- engage critically with the biographical method and analyze its current permutations.
- master the ability to discuss artists and works of art within the discipline of art history.
- practice presenting their research orally.
- practice providing feedback as peer reviewers.
- produce a substantial research paper with all of the required elements (initial and final drafts, thesis and argument with review of literature, proper citations of relevant sources, figures with captions, and bibliography).

Requirements

All students are expected to:

(1) attend every class and participate fully in class activities

(2) come to class having read all of the assigned selections for that day and with a brief summary of each selection in their notes

(3) once during the semester, read aloud their summary of an assigned reading and lead discussion on the selection using questions they have written in advance; submit the summary and questions on Canvas

(4) complete an online tutorial for a <u>citation manager</u> and use the manager through the semester to gather and format sources for their paper

(5) attend the HESCAH lecture by Dr. Andrew Hamilton on September 26 at 6:00 pm at the Harn Museum of Art and submit a short response to the lecture on Oct. 2

(6) find an in-depth article or book that uses the biographical method and write a critical review of it, due Oct. 9

(7) meet with the professor in office hours to select a paper topic, and submit a brief paper abstract and working bibliography on Oct. 30

(8) present the progress of their research to the class in advance of the paper due date, using the standard conference-paper format. Incorporate oral feedback into the final paper.

(9) submit a draft of their research paper on Nov. 13 and complete a peer review of a classmate's paper by Nov. 30.

(10) finalize and submit a roughly 15-page research paper by Dec. 11, taking into account previous feedback.
