<u>COURSE OBJECTIVES:</u> To introduce aspiring directors to rudimentary elements of Directing through the art of collaboration. We will explore a creative process through script analysis, stage composition, blocking, rehearsal techniques and visualization. Theories and conceptual elements, casting as well as working with actors and designers will also be explored.

- A. To establish a common vocabulary and analysis that serve as a foundation for fundamental skills of the director's role along with critical thinking.
- B. To develop an understanding of the intention of the playwright and the super objective of the play and bringing it to the stage.
- C. To develop in the student an understanding of the compositions of stage pictures collaborating with actors and designers.
- D. To introduce the student to the concepts of script analysis and the application of that analysis to begin blocking the play.
- E. To expose the student to basic methods of organizational skills of a script and scene break down in order to create a cohesive schedule with the stage manager.
- F. To develops skills to collaborate with designers from the concept to the realization of that concept to the stage. Also, working with the production team to create a clear understanding and communication of expectations for everyone involved.

COURSE CONTENT:

- A. What does a director do and where do you begin.
- B. Script analysis and the application of that analysis.
- D. Directing scenes two contrasting pieces not to exceed five minutes each.
- E. Design concepts and communication with designers.
- F. The art of critical thinking and communication with actors to work through a creative process.

REQUIRED TEXT: THE DIRECTORS VOICE (VOLUME 2) by Jason Loeth. **References:** The Directors Vision by Louis E. Catron & Scott Shattuck, The Creative Act: A Way of Being by Rick Rubin.

PERFORMANCE CRITIQUE GUIDELINES:

- A. Topics for discussion are directly related to class content (Directing, Concept, Stage Composition, Blocking, Visualization and Design and Production values.)
- B. Structure
 - 1. Thesis statement: (opening paragraph)
 - 2. Three to four paragraphs relevant to support thesis statement.
 - 3. Conclusion (closing statement and final paragraph)
- C. Length 500 words, 3 to 4 pages double space.
- D. Header on upper left hand corner should include your name, course name, name of play and playwright.

SELF-EVALUATION: The self-evaluation should be one or two pages evaluating your work, growth and varied assignments throughout the semester. The self-evaluation should be turned in with your performance critique.
