To develop in each student critical thinking and analysis in the collaborative nature of acting, singing and dancing by participating in rehearsals and participating in song performance and analysis through devised work.

- C. To expose the student to the basic methods of physical and vocal freedom in rehearsals and performance.

WRITTEN ASSINGMENT : SELF-EVALUATION

The self-evaluation should be one or two pages evaluating your work, growth and varied assignments throughout the semester in this class. The self-evaluation should be turned on the date of the calendar. **2 points will be deducted for each day it is late.**
