COURSE DESCRIPTION

Introduction to drawing the figure from live models and anatomical references using a variety of art materials, techniques, and artistic approaches.

The purpose of this course is to help students obtain the basic skill of drawing the human form, including anatomy, observation of the human form and fundamental exercises in gesture, contour, outline, and tonal modeling.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Upon the completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Understand basic anatomical relationships relevant to descriptive drawing of the human form.
- Demonstrate competence in linear methods of drawing images of the life model.
- Demonstrate competence in tonal methods of drawing images of the life model.
- Understand and be able to depict basic proportional relationships of the life model.
- Understand rhythms of the body and natural forms and how they exist in the whole and parts of the figure.

CLASS STRUCTURE & REQUIREMENTS

The majority of class time will be structured around drawing the human figure or anatomical reference objects, such as skeletons and plaster busts. Each class will focus on specific objectives. Numerous demonstrations will be given during the semester.

This class is a collaborative learning experience; please feel free to ask for more information that is of special interest to you within the context of the class.

CONTENT WARNING

In this course, we will cover content and materials that some may find difficult. It is important that in an art course we do not shy away from engaging with materials that may be controversial or challenging. I will do my best to give you advance notice when specific materials or content covered may contain images, language or perspectives that some may find difficult. I encourage you to reach out to me if you are struggling with the course materials. In class, if you need to step away for a period of time as we are covering particular content, you may do so without penalty, but I ask that you remember that you are responsible for any information covered in your absence.

HOMEWORK

- 1. Students are required to attend 4 sessions of the 3-hour figure drawing lab (Fridays 1pm 4pm) and include the work in the assignment portfolio the lab will be monitored by a graduate student. Students will need to sign into the lab with the supervising GTA when arriving and leaving.
- 2. Sketchbook The content of the sketchbook is entirely up to each individual, although it must obviously contain figure sketches, research, and any notes or observations pertinent to this field of study. Collage, found imagery, magazine, newspaper clippings, etc. may be pasted in. The purpose of the book is to act as a journal of your thoughts and observations around the subject of life-study. This book will be handed in three times over the semester (see course calendar). You are expected to show evidence of a practice of life drawing outside of the classroom: find ways to integrate figure drawing with your regular life. Use the opportunity to experiment while the sketchbook will be graded holistically, these drawings are for you. Concentrate on the process, not the product. See Canvas for specific requirements.
- 3. Each student is expected to spend at least 6 hours (in addition to class time) working on each drawing assignment assigned as homework. Homework will involve body studies that will explore various possibilities of value, form, and structure. These will serve as preliminary explorations and studies for drawing the complete human body.

CRITIQUES

Open forum critiques sessions, with small and large groups, will be held to evaluate and discuss students' work. Both conceptual and formal aspects of the drawings will be addressed.

EVALUATION & GRADING

50% - Classroom Drawing Portfolio (drawn from all in-class drawings from semester)

25% - Homework (Drawings assignments: hands & feet, head in space, self portraits)

15% - Figure drawing lab portfolio and Sketchbook

10% - Research Participation and Presentation

It takes time to make art. Explore the creative handling of techniques and materials and finish in the overall form—based on inspiration, expression, and intent. START EARLY-- work through each class to its end. Complete your work--this includes all facets of the assignment. Each student has a personal approach, aesthetic and level of technical experience. Use what you know while also challenging yourself.

Assignments will be evaluated according to the following criteria:

Successful resolution of the assigned problem. Initiative—scope of undertaking. Did you challenge yourself? Craftsmanship, neatness, attention to detail. Inventiveness. Punctuality.

Overall artistic design.

Personal expression and style is encouraged, however, keep in mind that this is a foundation class, and therefore, students are expected to produce work that will meet the standards of the class. Grades for each assignment will be given primarily in terms of the understanding of the concept/method taught. Your attitude and effort during the progress of each assignment will also be graded, as well as the quality of the final product and the professionalism of the presentation.

LATE POLICY:

Assignments are due when indicated by the instructor by default. Certain assignments will only take place during class time and may be difficult for the student to make up. In this case, it is the responsibility of the student to make arrangements with the instructor on how to make up the assignment. No late assignments will be accepted unless contracted with the professor. Please communicate well in advance if you know your assignment will be late. Late assignments will drop 1 letter grade per class period late. The instructor is prepared to make allowances given the uncertain circumstances at hand and the general challenges of academia and life today, but they can only be made following communications from students: no communication, no allowances! It's never too late to let the instructor know if you require accommodations.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

Attendance and full participation means: be on time, prepared to work, with the proper materials and research needed for class, there will be no deviations from this policy. Participation, support, and respect in all phases of this course are imperative. University guidelines stipulate that each three-hour credit class includes six hours of out-of-class preparation and study. You will need to complete six hours of outside work per week, including the Friday figure lab and should schedule your out of class time appropriately.

You are expected to participate in a responsive manner during critiques. You are expected to participate in studio clean up as well as to practice safe and thoughtful use of materials, tools and facilities.

Roll will be taken promptly as students set up for the day's exercise, discussion, demonstration, or critique. Late arrivals will be marked tardy and leaving early will be noted. It is the student's responsibility to make sure the instructor has marked them late instead of absent. If a student is late to a critique, it will result in ½ a letter grade deduction from the project grade; absence from a critique will result in one letter grade deduction. Any three late arrivals or early self-dismissals will count as one absence.

Each student is allowed 3 unexcused absences. Any absences beyond the 3rd will drop the student's final participation grade 1 letter grade for each absence over 3. In the case of this course, this is a lenient policy, because any absence greatly affects the amount of time spent on a project. The project's final grade can be greatly affected by absences. Missing a critique will result in a 1-letter grade deduction from the critiqued assignment's original grade. Announced changes to the course calendar, demonstrations, critiques, and discussions demand the student's presence; compensatory work of another kind cannot be accepted in lieu of missed instruction in this area.

LOCKERS / STORAGE:

SA+AH is not responsible for items in lockers. Please watch for posted signs on lockers regarding their use. Each student must share a locker with at least one other student. You are responsible for keeping the locker form attached to your lockers. Lockers will be cleaned out at the end of each semester. When storing materials it is advisable that you have your name on everything with a black marker, the course you are in, and the instructor's name. SA+AH is not responsible for items left in classrooms.

SAFETY & STUDIO USE:

The studio is for your use outside of class time. You will be given the combination to the studio. You are expected to follow studio guidelines at all times. Do not work alone in the rooms. The closest telephone is on the second floor/SE corner. There is a first aid kit in each room as well as a sharp edge container for your use. Please read and respect studio use guidelines posted in the classrooms. Do not pour solvents down the sinks. Each student is responsible for assisting in studio clean up after. Your instructor will assign you a duty. The classroom should be organized at the end of each class.

FIXITIVES, MISTS, ADHESIVES, SPRAY PAINT

*Use of aerosol products (such as fixative, spray paint) may only be used in the designated spray booth in FAC 211A.

- Both permanent and workable spray fixatives used to fix drawings contain toxic solvents. There is high exposure by inhalation to these solvents because the products are sprayed in the air, often right on a desk or easel. Additionally, you can be inhaling the plastic particles that comprise the fixative itself.
- Spray mists are particularly hazardous because they are easily inhaled. If the paint being sprayed contains solvents, then you can be inhaling liquid droplets of the solvents. In addition, the pigments are also easily inhaled, creating a much more dangerous situation than applying paint by brush.
- Aerosol spray paints have an additional hazard besides pigments and solvents. They contain
 propellants, usually isobutanes and propane, which are extremely flammable and have been the
 cause of many fires. Other aerosol spray products such as retouching sprays, spray varnishes,
 etc. also contain solvents.
