Course Description:

The Senior Project offers graduating BA students in theatre an opportunity to synthesize and expand upon the knowledge and skills acquired throughout their academic journey. This course emphasizes the integration of practical theatre experiences with rigorous academic research. Students will undertake a comprehensive research assignment, culminating in a thesis-style senior project paper that articulates their findings and insights. This Senior Project serves as a platform for students to demonstrate their scholarly and creative abilities, preparing them for future academic or professional pursuits in the field of theatre.

Highlighting Former Successful Senior Projects:

The following examples showcase the diversity and depth of research and creative work possible:

- 1. *The Involvement of Women in Theatre and the Feminist Movement*: This project explored how women's participation in theatre has supported and advanced the feminist movement in the United States. The student conducted extensive research to highlight key figures and moments in theatre history that contributed to feminist progress.
- 2. *Directing and Choreographing 35MM with Florida Players*: One student took on the dual role of Director and Choreographer for a production of 35MM with Florida Players. Their project detailed the preparation, process, and experiences related to their Theatre degree and Dance minor. The student reflected on the skills and insights gained, which they plan to apply in future directorial positions.
- 3. *Catharsis through Film and Theatre Viewing*: This project delved into the concept of catharsis, examining the psychological effects of watching films and live theatre performances. The student conducted a comparative analysis to understand how different mediums evoke emotional responses and contribute to psychological well-being.

Required Materials:

- 1. Access to a computer and/or writing software
- 2. Ability to convert documents to PDF files

MLA or Chicago Style Format:

Senior Project should follow MLA (Modern Language Association) or Chicago Style Guidelines. The Purdue University's Online Writing Lab (OWL) is a great resource: <u>https://owl.purdue.edu/owl/research_and_citation/index.html</u>

Grading:

This course embraces the philosophy of *un-grading*. Simply, complete assignments (meeting paper benchmarks) receive complete points. Because students come to this space with varying synthesis and exegesis proficiencies, diverse pedagogical backgrounds and analytical skills, *time*, *effort*, and *commitment* are the crux of your grade.

Full participation is crucial in grading - i.e., thorough and thoughtful revisions, clear communication through drafting process, etc.

- 1. *Synthesize Knowledge and Skills*: Students will integrate practical theatre experiences with academic research to produce a comprehensive thesis-style paper, demonstrating their ability to synthesize and apply their accumulated knowledge and skills.
- 2. *Conduct Independent Research*: Students will design and execute an independent research project, employing appropriate methodologies and critical analysis to explore a specific topic within the field of theatre.
- 3. *Communicate Scholarly Insights*: Students will articulate their research findings and insights effectively through written and oral presentations, showcasing their scholarly and creative abilities and preparing them for future academic or professional endeavors in theatre.

 - Grammar and spell-checking
 - Generating ideas or outlines
 - Conducting preliminary research
 - Providing feedback on drafts
- 3. Prohibited Uses of AI / AI tools may not be used to:
 - Write entire essays or large sections of text
 - Paraphrase or rephrase existing content to pass it off as original work
 - Generate citations or references without proper verification
- 4. Transparency:
 - Students must disclose any use of AI tools in their work. This includes specifying which tools were used and how they contributed to the final essay.
- 5. Accountability:
 - Students are responsible for the content of their essays, including any errors or inaccuracies introduced by AI tools. Proper verification and critical evaluation of AIgenerated content are required.
- 6. Respect for Intellectual Property:
 - Students must respect copyright laws and avoid using AI tools to generate content that infringes on the intellectual property rights of others.
- 7. Commitment to Learning:
 - The primary goal of essay assignments is to enhance learning and critical thinking skills. Students should use AI tools as aids, not substitutes, for their own intellectual efforts.
