## **Course Description:**

The focus of this course is tilemaking and the history of tiles in Ohio, Puerto Rico, and Palestine. This course will provide a broad understanding of the history of tiles in the student's practice as well as their histories in Ohio, Puerto Rico, and Palestine. In this course, both technical skills and a conceptual understanding of the relationship between historical tiles and the student's studio practice will be developed. Throughout the semester, the student will develop their own clay body, research historical tiles, and clay bodies. They will use this information to create a final creative project and complete a paper tying this research into their own thesis work.

## **Course Objectives:**

- -Develop a definition of tiling/piecing/fragments as they relate to the student's studio practice
- -Gain a broad understanding of the history of tilemaking in Ohio, Palestine, and Puerto Rico
- -Develop a clay body intended for tilemaking
- -Understand the aspects that make a clay body suitable for tilemaking
- -Understand the relationship of this research to the student's studio work and to integrate this information into their thesis project
- -To complete a written component relating the student's thesis work to the history of tiles learned in this course
- -To complete a tile project using the clay body developed in this course

## **In-Class Recording**
