Objectives. The goals of this course are to prepare and perform/workshop vocal compositions by UF composers at the highest possible level. The purpose of the course is to nurture relationships between composers and performers, and facilitate fruitful collaborations in creating new vocal music.

Course Requirements.

- Attendance is crucial to the success of the class as a whole (see “Grading” below).
- Professional behavior, proper attitude, and full participation are expected at all times.
- Students are required to have all necessary music and a pencil at ALL rehearsals and performances.
- Students are expected to learn their parts and come to class prepared.
- While discussions of new pieces and providing constructive feedback are encouraged, students should not talk during the rehearsal other than during the designated times for discussion. If there is a need to speak up, a student should raise a hand and be mindful of the rehearsal time.
- Students should strive to speak with empathy and understanding. We may have students with very different backgrounds and experiences, which you are encouraged to value for the variety of perspectives that brings us.

- No food, drink (other than water), or gum chewing are allowed during class.

Required Materials.

- No textbook is required for this course; however, students must use a folder or a tablet to keep the music and bring it to all rehearsals.
- All materials for the course will be distributed to students and are written by the UF composers. Please do not copy or distribute copyrighted material without permission.

Final Exam. There is no final exam for this course.

Grading.

- The final grade will be determined based on student attendance and participation.
- Students are not excused for work, sorority/fraternity functions, activities related to other courses, etc.
- Common excused absences include illness and circumstances outside your control. Please always communicate with the instructor (in advance, if possible).
- Any unexcused absence will result in a 5% deduction.
- In-person classes begin when the instructor begins warm-up exercises. Unexcused late arrivals for class may merit grade reduction. Exceptions may be made for extenuating circumstances.
- Students who leave class early, who leave and return, or who inappropriately use phones, tablets, etc. without permission may receive a grade reduction up to 3% for each instance depending on the amount of class time missed or disrupted.
- A doctor's note may be required to excuse illness.

- Unexcused absence from a scheduled performance will result in a grade no higher than "C."
- Unexcused absence from a designated dress rehearsal or special rehearsal will result in a one-letter grade reduction of the final grade.
- Unexcused tardiness to a dress rehearsal, special rehearsal, or warm-up for a performance will result in the loss of 1/3 of a letter grade (ex. A- becomes B+).
- Leaving after a concert before the stage is cleared and all equipment is put away will result in the loss of one letter grade (if applicable).
- If a student has any potential conflicts with any performances or dress rehearsals, they should contact the instructor during the first week of classes or as soon as possible after becoming aware of the conflict.
